# The View From the Periphery: Life in the Provinces of the Roman Empire

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This general course on the history of the Roman Empire takes the opposite view from the one normally adopted in courses, textbooks, TV shows, etc. on Ancient Rome: instead of viewing the world from Rome outwards, we see how the world looks and functions in the provinces, far from the capital. In the provinces we shall visit a few of the many peoples who actually made up the Empire.

The course will survey a wide variety of topics, including ethnicity, religion, local politics, commerce, entertainment and leisure. The course is intended as a stand-alone introductory view of the Roman Empire, an incentive to explore the history of Rome in other courses and venues, and a platform for thinking about some of the larger, overarching themes of human history, such as personal identity, the nature of empire and imperialism, the impact of the everyday experiences of human experience like language and social interactions on larger historical movements.

Each week, students will be required to attend the lecture and to prepare the assigned weekly reading, most of which will be in sources from the ancient period — the best way to study history!
